

## CARBAJOSA DE LA SAGRADA TO ALBA DETORMES STRETCH

# NATURE TRAIL VIA DE LA PLATA

1. Initially starts at the industrial park of La Sagrada (in particular, at calle 'Vertical'), a few kilometers far from the capital of the province. An information panel marks the start of this stretch, where you can see, on your left, the former platform of the train going to Salamanca.

2. In this first stretch, the trail goes under road SA-20, and, then after Salamanca street, leaving the local graveyard on a side. Along this route, you will have several chances to go to the center of Cabrajosa through different paths, until you finally leave this town behind and walk among crops and fields.

3. This landscape of crops, fallow lands and pastures will accompany you for a good part of the trail. It only changes when the trail crosses the ditches carved for the railway to go through, where it meets with other paths giving access to lands, and the presence of monadnocks.

4. Two of those hills are a must-see that you can enjoy while taking advantage of the rest area to the right of the trail. They are called the Arapiles (the Arapil Chico on the left, the Arapil Grande on the right). The Battle of Salamanca took place here during the Peninsular War. From this spot, the Arapil Grande can be accessed. Atop the hill, there is a monument commemorating the


5. After the branch going to Calvarrasa de Arriba, the landscape completely changes, taking you through a holm-oak wood (*Quercus ilex* subsp. *ballota*), which gets thicker as you walk on. The trail continues, with many intersections with other paths giving access to private properties, among which an abandoned brick factory next to the Mazalde Alba halt, which is used for livestock today.


6. Still in the holm-oak wood, a nearby rest area allows the walker to admire the landscapes of Salamanca, with the help of an information panel. Then, you will pass by another ditch with naked slopes allowing you to see the peculiar colors of the rocks, and you will cross the bridge giving access to La Maza plot land.

7. At this point, the trail reaches its highest altitude, and the holm-oaks grow scarcer and scarcer, giving way to flowering plants and bushes (Spanish lavender -*Lavandula stoechas*, rosemary -*Rosmarinus officinalis*- and thymes -*Thymus zygis*-) where the soil has not been used to grow cereal. Going back to the crop fields, the presence of wooden fences on the sides of the trail becomes common when it crosses a stream or path. Near the path giving access to Teradillos is the only fountain in the nature trail.

8. A traffic light once used for regulating the trains marks the end of the last ditch, which is almost the end of the trail itself, next to a rest area, a parking space and the information panel on the Nature Trail of Vía de la Plata that you have just completed. Nearby, it is easy to discover the remains of the old railway to Alba de Tormes: the switches, stretches of train tracks and caution signals marking the crossings.

9. Red kites (*Milvus milvus*), short-toed snake eagles (*Circaetus gallicus*) and magpies (*Pica pica*) are easily spotted flying over the station, on their way to the nearest river after which this village is named.
